Over the past month, I had the opportunity to present to the Measure B Advisory Committee on ways career pathways offered by Mendocino College link to the skills needed for upcoming staffing positions at the new psychiatric health facility being constructed in Ukiah. Certificate/Degree pathways include Licensed Vocational Nursing (LVN), Human Services, Addiction and Recovery Counseling, LVN to RN Bridge program, and Registered Nursing (RN). The new psychiatric health facility (Cal. Code Regs. Tit. 22, § 77061) will need a registered nurse, a licensed vocational nurse, or a psychiatric technician on duty in the facility at all times. Students completing the LVN or RN pathways will qualify to staff these required positions.

As the regional CEO representative on the Community College Affordability, Food & Housing Access Taskforce I spent two days in the Central Valley at the Annual Basic Needs Summit. Practitioners from throughout the state hear about best practices and discuss supporting the critical basic needs of our students.

SPRING 2025 ENROLLMENTS

Spring enrollment across the district is currently 8% FTES over last year. It is still early in the registration cycle and the numbers will continue to change; however, this is positive news. Significantly, Spring FTES are above 2019 and 2018 levels.

NATIVE AMERICAN STUDENT SUPPORT SUCCESS PROGRAM

The 2024 Native American Heritage Celebration was a resounding success, drawing over 300 attendees and receiving positive feedback from the community. The event featured a Native Art Exhibit in the Eagle Support Center showcasing handmade regalia and baskets from elders and students. Speakers emphasized the importance of community and inclusivity, while cultural activities such as stick games, basket weaving, walnut dice, and traditional foods allowed attendees to engage with Native American traditions. We are grateful to our staff, students, and volunteers for making this celebration a meaningful experience that fosters a sense of belonging for Native American students and their communities.

PRODUCE WEDNESDAYS

Throughout the Fall semester the Basic Needs Program hosted Produce Wednesdays. Every Wednesday, the Basic Needs Department offers fresh produce to students, supported by Redwood Food Bank. This initiative helps address food insecurity and promotes healthy living by providing students with access to fresh fruits and vegetables. By collaborating with local organizations such as Public Health, Cal Fresh, and Blue Zones, the program fosters a sense of community while supporting students' well-being and academic success.

FINANCIAL AID

With the 2025-26 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and California Dream Act Application (CADAA) now available, the financial aid staff has begun their yearly outreach to all high schools in our district. Starting with Ukiah High School on December 5th, staff host in-person workshops to provide students with information on financial aid and scholarships, and provide assistance in submitting their FAFSA or Dream Act applications.

EOPS

On December 3rd EOPS and Basic Needs hosted a lunch to celebrate the 55th anniversary of the EOPS program and the end of the semester. The Extended Opportunity Program and Services (EOPS) was legislatively mandated in 1969 with the passage of SB 164 (Alquist). For 55 years EOPS has supported students through their Community College education. At Mendocino College, the EOPS program is committed to providing over and above student support services such as priority registration, personalized counseling, book vouchers, extended tutoring, and much more to our students. It is our goal to provide our EOPS students with the tools and support that is needed for them to succeed in their academic and/or vocational goals.



TEXTBOOK AFFORDABILITY: A YEAR AT A GLANCE

Thank you to all our faculty and staff who have helped our textbook affordability goals here on campus. There are many ways we reduce the instructional material cost students face when attending college. We couldn't do this without everyone's efforts.

Here is a quick glance at what students had access to this school year. There were 934 (61%) Zero Textbook Cost Sections and 59 Low Textbook Cost Sections. The College Library's Textbook Lending Program loaned 979 textbooks and calculators. The materials from the Textbook Lending Library are available for students for the whole semester.

The college library will have different hours over the winter break.



He strongly believes in taking care of the land and always giving more than what is taken from it. Joey started a forestry crew for his tribal nation, which is currently under development and flourishing. Joey consistently pursues to be the best version of himself, to lead by example for his tribal community, and he is always thinking of new and interesting ways to become self-sufficient. Joey wishes self-sufficiency for all tribal nations. Joey is the top student in his Native American History course, a UC/CSU class where he has outstanding attendance and academic standing.

Rosa Ceja-Lopez is a first-generation student at Mendocino College and plans to complete the Dental Assisting program. She is proud of leading by example her young daughters and teaching them that anything is possible! She has worked diligently towards the completion of her program for the past six years and is finally nearing her career goal of working as a dental hygienist. Rosa has perfect attendance and is currently the number one student in her Racial and Ethnic Relations class.

Cruz Billy is an enrolled member of the Hopland Band of Pomo Indians. He finds so much of what he is learning in a Native American History course as beneficial and loves learning about the diverse history of tribal groups in the country. Cruz is completing his first semester at Mendocino College and is a Computer Application and Office Administration major Cruz is a stellar student and currently holds the highest position in his class. He has perfect scores on every assignment/exam.

Elaine Faye Figg-Hoblyn is working on her Associate of Arts degree in Sociology AND Psychology for Transfer at Mendocino College. Elaine has worked as a Social Worker III for Mendocino County for many years and has worked hard full-time while managing her family. As a non-traditional student, Elaine balances her coursework, job, and family obligations. Elaine plans to make a difference in policies that determine how children receive the social, behavioral, and mental health services they need, especially among foster youth and families. HISPANIC/LATINEX ALUMNI SUCCESS STORIES

As part of our Alumni Spotlight series, the Mendocino College Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) staff would like to spotlight: **Vicente Rodriguez**. Vicente's story highlights the opportunities that come with hard work and the opportunities that are granted to those who step outside of their comfort zone.

Vicente's inspiration and advice to current Mendocino College students:

"If you want more for your life, you have to get out of your comfort zone and make sacrifices. If you don't ask questions, and if you don't network and ask others about their experiences, you'll never know what is out there. What is out there could change your life."

Vicente's journey within Higher Education:

Like many students in Mendocino and Lake County, Vicente found himself feeling limited by his low-income background; when it came to getting a college education, Vicente shared that his parents did not have the means to pay for him to go to college, so instead, Vicente pursued a degree at Mendocino College while living at home with his parents in Ukiah. But, Vicente did not let his low-income background negatively impact him. Instead, Vicente took advantage of the services and support programs available to him including the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP), access to an academic counselor, and support from several of his instructors.

Apart from the scholarships, grants, and other financial aid Vicente received during his time at Mendocino College, he shared how his involvement in CAMP provided him opportunities to attend professional development workshops and go on campus tours. The exposure Vicente received from being part of CAMP allowed him to gain an understanding of the various opportunities that were out there for him after Mendocino College. One of these opportunities was a summer internship with the Bureau of Land Management thanks to the support and guidance of his academic counselor, Alicia Mendoza. During Vicente's time with CAMP, Alicia helped guide Vicente by highlighting opportunities available to students like himself.

Besides Alicia, Vicente shared how both his business instructor, Julie Finnegan, and math instructor, Leslie Banta, were key to his academic success.

Yet, success did not come easily for Vicente. During his time at Mendocino College, there were multiple instances in which he questioned his ability to succeed. Vicente questioned whether attending college was the right choice after underperforming in several of his classes. Luckily, Vicente did not give up. Instead, he decided to ask for help; he reached out to his professors and received support from his peers ultimately allowing him to graduate and transfer to Sonoma State.

Vicente's ambitions did not stop after graduating from Sonoma State and earning his degree in Business and Economics. In Vicente's goal to become a Secret Service Agent, he joined the U.S. Air Force, was stationed in the United Kingdom, and supported the Armed Forces Europe (AE) and Air Force Space Command. Once his military service was completed he decided to utilize his G.I. Bill benefits to pursue a graduate degree at George Washington University. His graduate program allowed him to intern for the Executive Office of the President which ultimately helped him secure a position within the Department of State with the Bureau of Counterterrorism upon graduation. Vicente is currently pursuing a Law degree at the George Washington University Law School.
